Disaster Preparedness

Japan gets a lot of typhoons and storms through the summer and autumn. In the past, Miyazaki has had a lot of heavy rain, resulting in



rivers overflowing, houses flooding, landslides and similar problems that can cause a lot of damage. In this month's Living In Miyazaki, we will share some important information about what to do in the event of a natural disaster.

Warning Levels:

The Warning Levels exist to help people gain an understanding of the threat level of a possible or impending disaster, and what actions they need to take.

[Warning Level / Warning Name / What you need to do]

Warning Level 1 / Early Warning (Issued by the Japan Meteorological Agency) / Be aware of a possible natural disaster

Warning Level 2 / Heavy Rain, Flood or High Water Level Advisory (Issued by the Japan Meteorological Agency) / Confirm your evacuation route

Warning Level 3 / Evacuation Warning for Elderly People, etc. ** (Issued by local authorities) / Elderly people and anyone requiring assistance or extra time to do so should evacuate from dangerous areas

Warning Level 4 / Evacuation Order (Issued by local authorities) / Everyone should evacuate from dangerous areas

Warning Level 5 / Emergency Safety Warning * (Issued by local authorities) / Danger to life. Take whatever action necessary immediately to ensure your own safety!



- * In the event of a Level 3 Warning, not only the elderly but also anyone needing extra time or any assistance in evacuating, such as disabled people, should evacuate from dangerous areas.
- * At Warning Level 5, finding yourself unable to evacuate safely could be an incredibly dangerous situation, so do not wait for an emergency safety warning to evacuate!
